

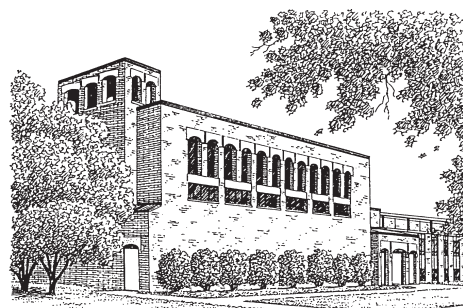
# Gloryland Gospel Band

## The Whole-ly Bible

One of the not un-foreseen consequences of making the shift to the Narrative Lectionary that we've been using now for a few weeks is that we will be reading some passages from scripture that we never read before. Not on a Sunday morning in church anyway. For many decades we read the same things over and over, on either a one-year or three-year rotation, but, as for variety, that was about it. What it means is that we passed over some stuff along the way.

That's not all bad. I love the Psalms, but there's something kind of creepy about reading together in unison the parts of some of them that call for God to rain down destruction on our enemies—especially after what Jesus told us about loving them. And some of the so-called holy wars that we hear about in books like Joshua have such a ring of violence to them that would sound unseemly coming from the pulpit or if our choir were to sing about them. Plus, like Luther would say, not all parts of the Bible testify to Christ as clearly as others, so it's OK to pick and choose a bit.

But there's something I like about taking a look

at some of the less familiar stories in the Bible. Sometimes they're more gritty, less polite, than what we're used to. The characters can seem more human—and not in a good way, necessarily—but real, and flawed, just like us.

Thomas Jefferson famously took a scissors to his New Testament, cutting out the parts he didn't much care for. Most of us simply “sanitize” the Bible by reading around the parts we're less sure of. But, of course the Bible comes to us as a whole. Sometimes the “heroes” aren't heroic at all. Sometimes the hard questions don't get a satisfactory answer. Some parts can even make us blush: “What? I didn't know THAT was in there!” Sometimes faith goes weak and sin abounds.

I, for one, am glad we are gently forcing ourselves to take another look at this Word to us... maybe a broader look than we've taken before. I know it's good for me to come face to face with the WHOLE Bible, not just the nice parts or the parts I like best. I hope the same proves true for you.

## Charitable Giving – Income Tax Considerations

*(Consult with your financial planner and/or tax advisor to determine if either of these situations may be advantages for you)*

### Gifts of Appreciated Securities

Gifts of appreciated securities (stocks, bond, mutual funds) can allow you to take a charitable contribution deduction for the current market value of the security on the date of the gift. And avoid the capital gains tax.

### Gifts from IRA Accounts

A specific provision for tax years 2010 and 2011 can allow persons 70½ or older to make contributions up to \$100,000 from IRA accounts directly to qualified charitable organizations and exclude the distribution

from your IRA from your gross income. The distribution qualifies as a required minimum distribution. Under this provision there is no charitable contribution deduction.

### Remember Oak Grove in Your Estate Planning

When you make your will, consider naming Oak Grove Enduring Gifts as one of your beneficiaries. Already have a will? You can update it to include Oak Grove Enduring Gifts as a beneficiary. You can help Keep Oak Grove Alive and Growing. Contact Pastor Tom or Maynard Wood for more information.

## When it Pays to be Older

With uncertainty in the financial markets and continued low returns on certificates of deposit, members of Oak Grove Lutheran Church who are 65 and older might consider making a gift that creates a steady, dependable, and perhaps even increased stream of lifetime income for themselves. A charitable gift annuity does just that, and provides a gift for the Oak Grove Lutheran Church Enduring Gifts Fund that will serve the needs of people in Christ's name in the community, the nation and around the world.

Example: Mr. and Mrs. Johnson are both 78 years old. They have a \$50,000 certificate of deposit coming due on October 1st. They can reinvest the CD at a 2% return, or they can gift \$50,000 in exchange for a charitable gift annuity. The charitable gift annuity rate for their combined ages happens to be 6.0%, which means they will receive \$3,000 every year and triple the income they would have otherwise received from a CD. (Note: The rates vary, depending on one's age, age of spouse if applicable and the current recommendations of the American Council on Gift Annuities.)

The Johnsons will receive fixed payments for the rest of their lives. When one of them dies, the surviving spouse will continue to receive the same fixed payments for the rest of his or her life. If they itemize on their income taxes, they will enjoy the added benefit of a charitable deduction in the year the gift is given. If they instead gift appreciated stock, they will also avoid paying capital gains tax. Upon the second death, the Oak Grove Lutheran Church Enduring Gifts Fund receives a gift that it can use in perpetuity for ministry.

## “Willie” by Todd Folstad

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People say you can learn almost anything from anyone at anytime. I'm living proof of that due to a recent encounter with a gentleman I'll call "Willie". That is not his name, but for protection of his true identity, it'll do.

I was going to Ft. Snelling National Cemetery the other day to "talk" to my father who passed away in May of 2005. I go there frequently to "chat", tho most of the talks are very one-sided. I just like to verbalize my thoughts and since I always respected my Dad's opinion and truthful nature on everything, he seems the most likely candidate to listen now. As I exited off of highway 494 at exit 1B, I got to the bottom of the ramp at the change to a red light. There on the corner was a homeless man with his torn and dirty clothing and a ruck sack with all of his belongings. He was holding a sign asking for spare change or anything you could part with that he might be able to use. Most days I, like most motorists, pay these people no attention and just try to find ways not to make eye contact. This was no ordinary day.

Willie caught my gaze and began to move towards my vehicle. My window was down and some good ol' country music was blasting on my stereo. He commented that not too many folks listen to the old stuff anymore. I agreed and was about to go on my way when he turned back to me and said the oddest thing. "He misses you too". I was thunderstruck. How had this person known what I was thinking at that very moment about my departed father? This warranted deeper discussion, so I pulled my truck off to the side and came back with my ice fishing stool and a folding chair for myself and Willie and a couple of bottles of Propel I had in the truck.

Willie was surprised that someone who seemed so busy just moments before would take the time bring him some water and sit down to chat with him. I did not know why I did what I did at the time, but it would become abundantly clear in the next two hours.

Willie was a veteran from Vietnam, who like many had fallen on hard times and was not very employable once he returned home. He had his share of successes like most. Had been married and raised three wonderful kids and life was looking good. Until the day of the crash. He and his family had been driving home from Duluth when a semi overturned in the road ahead of them. Willie was the only survivor of the crash and that is where his new story began. Destitute and wracked with unimaginable guilt, he had tried suicide several times, unsuccessfully. The years flashed by in an hour like Christmas tree lights in his smoky green eyes. Suddenly we were in 2009, and Willie was homeless, living on whatever he could scrape up on a daily basis.

Willie asked me, "Have you found him"? I assumed he meant God or Jesus or a higher power or several of any deities under the expansive blue skies above. I answered that I had in my own way. He asked, "Does He ever mention ME"? I really didn't know how to answer, as in all my talks with my higher power, I had

never once received what I would call a straight forward answer, let alone a shout out to another of the flock. I swallowed hard as I could see the strain on Willie's face to get the answer to this question. "He hasn't yet, no", I answered, "but that doesn't mean that he hasn't shown you to me in other ways".

Now it was Willie's turn to look puzzled. He had no idea what I was talking about. I went on to tell him about how many different people I'd seen in the last decade, set up like him, on the off-ramps of America's highways. I said, "I've seen you in everyone of them, tho I never knew your name before". He smiled and said back, "I've been talking to him for years and never once did I think he was listening until now".

We chatted for another hour or so and when I left Willie, I gave him a \$20 and my prayers for a safe and hopefully better day. I never saw Willie at that off-ramp again and once checked with a police officer four months later who works in that area to see if there was any news. To my heartbreak, the officer told me of how Willie had passed, alone under a tree in Ft. Snelling. He had apparently climbed over the fence in the night on a particularly cold evening and tried to bundle up as best he could, but the night grew bitter and Willie's failing strength was no match for Mother Nature. The officer asked how I knew Willie and I recounted the story from above and the officer's eyes lit up. He told me that when Willie was found, he had an empty Propel bottle with a \$20 bill inside and they couldn't figure out why he hadn't spent it for shelter or food. I understood immediately and told the officer, "He didn't spend it because it was his answer from God, and I was the lucky, tho unknowing, messenger who brought it to him". That was over a year ago now and I still go out to talk to my Dad as often as I can. I also now stop at the tree where Willie passed as well to say Hi and wish him well on his new life.

I was lucky enough to be one of his last Networking contacts and possibly one of the most powerful in his life, tho the credit does not belong to me. Networking is not just about getting down to information and trying to find ways into companies to prolong our pitiful, yes I said PITIFUL, existence on this planet. Networking is about really opening up to other people and allowing them to share your heart and for you to partake in theirs.

When I network for business reasons now, I always think of Willie and try to take the time to really learn about the person I'm talking to on much more than a superficial level. Jobs come and go. Careers can be squashed by a downturn in the markets and bosses, good or bad, are just another drone in the endless conveyor belt we call the work world.

Getting to really know people and being able to help them, and thus, helping yourself, is really the best Networking we can ever hope to accomplish.

Sorry for the rant today, but I was at Ft. Snelling yesterday for awhile and it got me all nostalgic. If only we treated the people whom we deal with daily in the same form of reverence we give to the departed, then we would have a truly unbreakable network.
